Can select targets based on heat map. Recommended targeting detention centers and alternative schools. Requested evidence of effectiveness. Healing Hurt People program is a hospital-based intervention after someone has experience gunshot trauma. Requires more resources, funding, and effort but more effective. It is a part of the national hospital-based violence prevention program network.
