Overview:

Our Preparedness and Response team has been working extremely hard this last quarter. They have continued with increasing their trainings and meetings to in-person. Overall, the Coordinators are focusing on Coalition Development by:

- Working with the corridor chairs and facility EMCs to determine regional and corridor specific preparedness needs.
- Engaging all partners to increase corridor meeting participation, as well as radio checks.
- Offering to hospital staff on site EMResource, EMTrack and WebEOC training.
- Continuing to network with hospitals, EMS, Fire, Police, Public Health, and City/County EMCs to build strong partnerships.
- Working with the Behavioral Threat Assessment team, which includes Houston Police
 Department, Harris County Sheriff's Office, Texas DPS, FBI and local behavioral health facilities.
- Created a Behavioral Health workgroup which will begin meeting on January 11, 2023.
- Participated in the planning and implementation of the safety and security collaboration for Waller ISD and assisted with multiple lock-down drills.
- Attended the NHCPC (MESH) Conference.
- TSA-R Coordinator Jeremy Way presented at the NHCPC Conference.
- Director of Preparedness was named to the GETAC Disaster Preparedness and Response Committee.
- Attended the GETAC Injury Prevention and Public Education Committee.

- Attended the NETEC Webinar Lab Samples and Suspect Cases: How to handle, package, and ship specimens from high-risk patients.
- Coordinated local and State-wide Stop the Bleed training trainings.
- Attended the presentation for the Program of Distinction from IAHSS for Security Award at HCA Houston Healthcare Tomball.
- Assisting and supporting CIMA in preparation for their FSX's.
- Working with our Regional Logistics and Inventory Coordinator and the hospital staff to obtain an accurate inventory at each facility. This is nearly completed.
- Continue working with our RITA partners in regards to coordination and bringing in new EMS partners.
- Continue to work with our Adult Protective Services, and the boarding home issues.
- Our Special Populations Coordinator continues to engage long term, home health, rehab, and FSEDs into the coalition.
 - a. Developing a regional Hurricane Evacuation exercise for the Special Populations, scheduled for May 4, 2023
 - b. Provided 13 one on one visits with stakeholders
 - c. Added 123 new facilities into EMResource.
 - d. Increased stakeholders' participation in the Off The Grid Drill in December.

Community Events/Exercises:

- Participated in multiple planning meetings and provided resources for the Houston Marathon and CMOC support to the COH EOC January 15th – 16th during the race.
- Participated in a TTX with the City of Houston OEM for the Houston Marathon-December 12, 2022.
- Provided resources for the full-scale exercise with the Houston Police Department and Houston Fire Department. December 21, 2022.
- Provided resources for the Sam Houston University NCAA Division 1 football game, November 19, 2022.
- Planning as asset display day in March 2023 for the asset day.
- Participated in the FBI/DOE/DOD Full-Scale Planning exercise.

Logistics and Assets:

- RCVQ will begin refurbishment after receiving UASI Grant in the amount of \$200,000. Work will begin in a few weeks and include generator replacement, air system replacement, new paint job and re-striping, and technological updates.
- December the team focused on reorganizing and cleaning the warehouse.
- Routine maintenance and service continues to keep assets at an operational state.
- Harris County IFS has expressed interest in having SETRAC take control and operate a
 refrigerated box truck they received off a UASI grant several years ago. SETRAC staff will go
 assess the truck and develop a transition plan.
- Logistics staff continue to remain busy supporting the multiple events and incidents where resources were requested.

EMTF:

- Workgroup & Coordinator Meetings January 24-25, 2023 @ STRAC. Abbreviated component meetings in the morning and extended Ops Group meeting in the afternoon.
- Schedule for regional component meetings will be sent out via EMTF-6 ListServ.
- MPV 602 will receive 1.5 upgrades time OOS will be approximately 6-8 weeks. Refurb start date TBD.
- MPV 603 responded to a potential chemical exposure in Brazoria County 106 patients triaged and 6 transported, via ambulance, to regional hospitals.
- UTMB NICU Evacuation training MPVs 601, 603, 604 and UTMB staff.
- MPV 603 & SETRAC conducted a full-scale exercise with CIMA in La Porte.
- Border Support Mission in Dilley demobilized.
- Multiple regional partners participated in the Brazosport ISD active shooter workshop members present TFL, MIST, ASTs, and ASTLs.
- World Series Parade multiple regional agencies (Atascocita Fire Dept., MCHD, HCESD #8, Cy-Fair Fire Dept., HCEC, Ft. Bend County EMS, Clear Lake EMS, Windsor EMS, La Porte EMS, City EMS, Pearland FD EMS) provided 15 ambulances, MPVs 601 & 602, and UTV Medics to support HFD during the parade.
- Multiple Severe Weather Standby's.

End of Year Survey:

The annual End of Year survey has been completed by 78 facilities.

Healthcare Preparedness Capabilities

• Long Term Care Update (C102)

Special Population Stakeholders last meeting held on November 10, 2022. Members continue to discuss integrating the Special Populations meeting with all our corridor meetings in 2023. A discussion was held on EMResource changes made to the system. In-Person EMResource trainings will be held regionally to improve the use of EMResource with Special Populations group.

FSEDs last meeting was held on November 10, 2022. A discussion was held on the current RSV influx of pediatric patients in hospitals as well as Ebola planning and the RITA plan. Members continue to discuss integrating the FSEDs meeting with all our corridor meetings in 2023. EMTrack training will be provided to FSEDs in upcoming weeks.

Training and Exercise Update (C104)

The SETRAC "Off the Grid" drill was conducted on Thursday December 15th. After the information is compiled and documented an After Action Report will be made available on the SETRAC website.

Planning is underway for the 2023 RHPC Exercise. The exercise series will include five (5) corridor specific Tabletop Exercises (TTX's) and one Functional Exercise (FE). The tentative date for the Functional Exercise is Wednesday April the 12th, 2023. Additional information to include all exercise dates and registration will be provided as it comes available.

Inventory Update

All survey submissions have been received from healthcare facilities across the state for the TDEM PPE Stockpile Workgroup. The data is now under review and awaiting determination as to whether it is feasible to maintain strategically placed 30-60-90-day stockpiles of PPE.

Sub-Committee Updates

• Symposium Planning (C101)

Planning for the upcoming 2023 symposium begins in February with the first planning committee meeting scheduled for Monday, February 16th.

• Clinical Advisory Committee (C101)

The Clinical Advisory Committee for this year has been identified. The SETRAC Board approved a Medical Directors Committee to also serve as part the Clinical Advisory Committee.

Corridor Updates (C101)

- **Downtown Corridor** The Downtown Corridor met on December 2nd where corridor members conducted a water utility tabletop and discussed cyber security, operations continuity, radio checks, and active shooter issues.
- **South Corridor** The South Corridor met November 11th where the corridor members discussed cyber security and identified gaps. SETRAC is working with the City of Pearland OEM to conduct a preparedness boot camp the first quarter of this year.

- East Corridor The East Corridor met on December 9th where the corridor members discussed the influx of pediatric patients, pediatric disaster training scheduled for February 22nd-23rd and looking forward to engaging more EMS members in the corridor meetings.
- **North Corridor** The North Corridor met on December 14th. Jeremy Way gave a situational awareness training.
- **West Corridor** –The West Corridor met on December 16th where OakBend Medical Center gave a presentation on their recent cyber security event.

Partner Updates (C101)

Public Health

- Harris County Public Health Harris County is currently at Level Yellow for COVID. Passengers coming from China and Hong Kong must have a negative test result prior to boarding.
 - A COVID Related Census was distributed and Ms. Lori Upton reviewed the graph data with the coalition members. Coalition members were reminded that they are still required to report their data in EMResource daily.
- Houston Health Department The Houston Health department assisted with warming centers across the city including the George R. Brown Center over the Christmas holiday weekend.

OEM

 City of Houston (COH) – A meeting took place with their partners to discuss planning for the Houston Marathon on January 16th. The COH also assisted with the warming centers during the freeze.

EMS

SETRAC – The next Pre-Hospital Committee meeting is scheduled for Friday, January 20th, at SETRAC. The Clinical Advisory Committee is working to create an EMS toolkit/guidance for response to radiological incidents. A hospital recently received a deficiency on their designation survey for not having a plan in place to communicate with EMS agencies if their data or phone systems are down. SETRAC staff work with the hospital to use their hospital radio to designate a channel for communication with area EMS providers.

Open Discussion/Other

• EMS Wrist Band Program

There are several issues to be worked out before implementing the program. Chris Collier gave a brief overview of some of the issues and advised if a facility has a trauma or stroke designation, their facility

will be required to input the wristband number starting early 2024. EMS has no current requirement. The goal is to conduct a trail period once the bands are accepted and then conduct training.

• Mental Health Workgroup

Lisa Spivey reported SETRAC will be meeting with psych facilities. At this initial meeting, the discussion will surround the crisis of psych patients in the emergency departments and what challenges and obstacles they are facing. Moving forward, SETRAC will bring in EMS, law enforcement, and eventually bring in the emergency departments to start the conversation.

Prehospital / EMS Committee

- EMS Workforce Development Initiative (Senate Bill 8)
 - SETRAC staff have created a page on the website for EMS Education. The page gives information as

well as a link for potential recipients to complete some basic information prior to receiving an application to apply. There have been 250+ entries from individuals requesting information on applying. We have received a total of 35 applications.

Challenges / Issues

- Incomplete application packets being submitted. To include missing signatures, invalid financial information, inconsistencies in invoices from paramedic programs, and having agency leadership or recipient respond back in a timely manner after our staff request additional information or fixes.
- A recipient submitting a packet with a class start date within a week, with the unrealistic expectation that we will review, approve, and arrange to send the money to the school within a short time. Once an application is approved or will be approved staff will work with the agency or school to agree on a payment process.

• EMS Wristband Initiative

SETRAC is the final RAC that has not implemented some version of this initiative. The purpose of the bands is to be able to track the care of a patient during emergency responses and may extend to any patient treated via EMS prior to being treated at a hospital. Possible complications with implementing the initiative were discussed including how the wristband numbers will entered in patient records and funding. A plan for distribution of the bands to each EMS agency will be created for use in the event of an evacuation. Several agencies have agreed to trial the process and feedback will be provided to this committee. SETRAC is working to develop an implementation plan, education, and trial period.

Pulsara

Pulsara continues to be a discussion topic as there is a gaining interest in utilization of the product amongst EMS providers. Although not an official regional standard, most of the healthcare systems have the platform or are in the process of adding the platform. The committee discussed if the committee needs to adopt the use of Pulsara as a regional standard.

Regional Quality of Care

The committee has addressed a variety of topics and has encouraged members to attend other SETRAC committee meetings and encouraged those members to attend our meetings (stroke, trauma, inj. prev., cardiac, etc.). The group has received presentation and discussion regarding the Texas CARES program, EMS Whole Blood, Out of Hospital DNR.

Board Meeting Minutes October 17, 2022

1. CALL TO ORDER / ROLL CALL

Dr. David Persse, Chairman, called the meeting to order at 6:30pm. The meeting was held in-person at the SETRAC Conference Center. Walter Morrow called roll and a quorum was established.

2. WELCOME AND INTRODUCTION OF SPECIAL GUESTS

Dr. Persse welcomed the board members and the stakeholders in attendance. No special guests were in attendance for this meeting.

3. NOMINATIONS COMMITTEE

Mr. Flanagan had no items to report.

4. OFFICER REPORTS

A. Chairman

Dr. Persse reported that while the pandemic is not entirely over, COVID hospitalizations, wastewater samples, and positivity rates are down. Although not a new variant, COVID numbers are increasing in Europe and Australia had a severe flu season. Pediatric hospitals in our region have ICUs filled with flu patients. This flu season can have a large impact on our hospitals and EMS systems which makes SETRAC's ability to facilitate coordination even more important.

Dr. Persse recommended to everyone to be familiar with the regional RETA plan as well as their own agency / emergency department plans as the number of Ebola cases are rising in Uganda and can be transmitted by others who may be traveling to and from Uganda.

B. Vice Chair Hospital Services

Mr. Flanagan led a discussion on the use of Pulsara among hospital and EMS systems. Many hospitals and EMS systems are currently using the platform for communication regarding incoming cardiac patients. An ad hoc subcommittee will be formed among the hospital representatives of the board to discuss the use of Pulsara and determine if there is a consensus for recommending the use of the platform in the SETRAC region.

In January 2023, the state will require patients brought to an acute care facility via a 911 provider to have a specific wristband applied for patient tracking. The numbered wristband must stay on the patient until the patient is discharged from the facility. At this time, the wristbands are written into the trauma rules and reference its use for stroke patients as well. Facilities with a trauma registry will need to upgrade their registry to record the patient tracking number from the wristband. Mr. Flanagan will convene a call with Dr. Persse, Dr. Marc Boom, and Ms. Erin Asprec to persuade the state to delay the timing of implementing the wristband initiative. Mr. Flanagan encouraged board members to have their executives and colleagues reach out to their Texas Hospital Association (THA) representatives to encourage more

time for hospitals and agencies to prepare for the implementation of the initiative. A subcommittee will be formed to continue the discussion of this initiative.

Mr. Flanagan made a request to the board to approve:

- the creation of a medical directors committee, made of medical directors selected by each of the SETRAC Emergency Healthcare System committees, to serve as an advisory role to committee chairs, be the point person for any quality improvement referrals to that committee, and serve on the RHPC Clinical Advisory Committee.
- a revision to the bylaws to change the at-large position representing facilities to a position that would represent a jurisdiction.

C. <u>Vice Chair Pre-Hospital Services</u>

James Campbell reported that major items for EMS are the afore mentioned Pulsara and Texas wristband initiatives and EMS education, recruitment and retention.

D. Secretary

Mr. Morrow had no items to report.

E. Officer-at-Large Report

Dr. Brent Kaziny announced that a 1-year, \$3 million grant from ASPR has been received to create a Pediatric Disaster Care Center of Excellence. The Gulf Seven Pediatric Disaster Network (G7) will be a joint project with Texas Children's Hospital, Baylor College of Medicine, and other facilities along the Gulf Coast. SETRAC is one of the funded partners in the grant.

F. Treasurer Report

Lon Squyres provided an overview of the printed financial reports that were given to the board. The report shows the County Pass Thru 2022 funding has 9.7% of funds remaining as of August 31st; however, the grant has been fully spent as of this meeting. The general fund had a negative net revenue for year due to an unplanned, one-time expense of \$250,000. Otherwise, the general fund is still doing well overall.

Mr. Squyres commended Michelle Maynor, Tiffany Walker, and Ms. Upton for their assistance with the financials since the departure of the SETRAC comptroller, Donald Morrison.

5. EXECUTIVE REPORT

A written report was provided by Lori Upton to the board. Highlights include:

- Linh Tran, CPA, has been contracted on a short-term basis to assist the finance department with reviewing the finances for the past two years. Ms. Tran has helped extricate Maestro Services from SETRAC. A tax attorney assisted with the filing of federal tax returns for Maestro Services and it was determined that Maestro Services currently owes approximately \$15,000 in back taxes, fines, and penalties. The organization has the income to cover the debt and will not affect SETRAC. All books, taxes, and accounts are now in order.
- It is anticipated that the trauma rules for the state will be opened for formal public comment in March 2023.
- A page has been created on the SETRAC website for the EMS Education Fund. A form of eligibility will be created. Over 75 inquiries have been received. A committee will be created to review the contracts and applications and a part-time worker may be hired to assist with the applications and communicate with the EMS agencies.

- The allocation for this year's EMS / County Funds grant has once again decreased. The funds are weighted heavily toward rural counties according to the state legislature. The only way to change the allocation is through the legislature. The state has also found 100,000 of the reported runs for the region have bounced back and they are working with the affected agency to rectify the issue.
- SETRAC reached out to a tax firm to get a credit back on payroll taxes due to a state order regarding COVID and it was determined that SETRAC is eligible for all five quarters due to the normal course of business being drastically altered.

6. ACTION ITEMS

A. Prior Meeting Minutes

There being no further discussion or objections, the board approved the minutes as presented.

B. Reports (Officer, Finance, and Executive)

There being no further discussion or objections, the board approved the reports as presented.

C. Resolutions and/or Other Action Items

a. Creation of the Medical Directors Committee

There being no further discussion or objections, the board approved the creation of the Medical Directors Committee.

b. Revision to Article 3 in SETRAC Bylaws concerning At-Large position for "Facilities" (Sections 3.2.4 and 3.5.4)

There being no further discussion or objections, the board approved the revision to the At-Large position to represent a jurisdiction instead of facilities.

7. GENERAL / OPEN DISCUSSION

No items were presented for discussion.

8. ADJOURNMENT

Dr. Persse adjourned the general board meeting at 7:20 pm. The board held an executive session following the conclusion of the meeting.
